This statutory guidance describes the temporary changes we have made to the school exclusion process due to coronavirus (COVID-19).

The <u>new regulations</u> change some of the procedures that must be followed in relation to an exclusion, to give greater flexibility to schools, parents and local authorities during the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak. They apply to all maintained schools, academies (including alternative provision academies but excluding 16 to 19 academies) and pupil referral units (PRUs).



DfE Exclusions Regulations:

- published 29th May
- cover the period 1 June 24th
 September 2020
- amend the School Discipline (Pupil Exclusions and Reviews) (England) Regulations 2012
- vary the usual procedural rules, in response to the coronavirus
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Exclusions - Questions for governors to ask:

- Is the school leadership team aware of these new regulations?
- Have risk assessments been undertaken for pupils 'at risk' of exclusion?

The new curriculum will be mandatory from September 2020. Schools are encouraged to adopt the new curriculum early from September 2019.

Hidden Harm initiative

- Cross-government initiative launched 22nd May
- A new government initiative aimed at tackling three areas of crime with huge impact on children's safeguarding:
 - Domestic abuse
 - Child sexual abuse
 - Modern slavery



Hidden Harm- questions for governors

- Is my school aware of the initiative?
- How significant are these factors within my school(s) context?
- Has the new 2020 guidance, on child sexual abuse, including on line safety, aimed at parents been shared?

The business of governance?

- Governance continues. Boards should be reflecting on:
 - School Development Plan priorities
 - Developing the curriculum
 - Budgetary considerations post-Covid-19
 - Appraisal processes
